School Supply Fees



Savona Elementary offers a user fee program for school supplies. For a nominal fee, we supply all pens, pencils, exercise books, crayons etc. that your child needs for the school year. Student fees for 2025/2026 are:

Grades K-3 \$42.00

Grades 4-7 \$58.00

We encourage you to sign up and use School Cash Online for payments, but you may also pay by cash or cheque by filling out the form included in your school start up package. Fees are due back by Friday, September 26th.

Indoor Shoes/Change of Clothes

It is expected that all students will have a pair of non-marking indoor shoes that can be left at school. We encourage primary students to keep a change of clothing in a Ziploc bag in their backpack in case of spills or accidents.

Water Bottles

We would like to remind parents that all students must have a water bottle labeled with their name on it that can be brought to and from school. Bottled water is brought in as our drinking water in Savona is often on a boil water notice and unsafe for drinking during that time.



Safe Arrival Program

If your child will be away from school, please call the Safe Arrival number at 1-844-350-2647, visit <https://go.schoolmessenger.ca> or download the app on your phone to report an absence. Information and instructions on how to use Safe Arrival are included in the school start up package. If you need additional help, please contact the office at 250-373-2520. In addition, if your child will be absent for a prolonged period, please let your teacher or the office know. When teachers know of an absence in advance, they can organize learning tasks that may otherwise be missed. Your cooperation is appreciated!



Forms and Permissions

With this newsletter, you will find the following forms that require parent/guardian signature. Please ensure these forms are returned to the office as soon as possible:

Student Verification Form (green) - Ensure all information is current, correct, dated and signed. Cross off and correct any errors or changes.

Fruit and Veggie Program (orange) - Healthy snacks provided free every few weeks.

Lower Risk Field Trip Form (blue) - Allows for short trips around the community: library, public playground, lake (not swimming), Terry Fox Run etc.

Personal Information (pink) - Allows SD#73 to collect, keep, use and share photos, videos, images and/or names on school or district website.

Outside Media (yellow) - Allows media (including radio, television, newspapers, and other print) that visit the school to take pictures or interview students. See form for more details.

Electronic Use Agreement (purple) - Allows student to use district technology resources.

Web access and Cloud Storage (white) - So students may receive a Google Apps for Education account (gedu) that is used with Chromebooks.

*****Please note not all students will receive all forms. Some forms need to be signed every year; other forms only need to be signed once. If we have a signed copy on file, it will not be included in this year's package. You may review all signed forms on file anytime at the office.***

Additional Forms

Additional forms that may be required can be obtained at the office. These might include:

Medical Alert/Medication - Please ensure that you inform the office if your child has a serious health condition or requires medication during school hours. This needs to be updated every year.

Transportation Assistance - This must be submitted to school board yearly to receive funds.

Aboriginal Programs and Services - Only sent home with students who have self-identified as being of Aboriginal ancestry.

TNRD Library Card Application – will allow students to sign books out at the public library on weekly class trips.

PAC - Parent Advisory Council

Research indicates that when parents are involved in their child's learning, student achievement increases. Savona Elementary is fortunate to have a fantastic group of parents committed to the improvement and well-being of our school community. Our PAC is always looking for fresh faces. National Day for Truth and Reconciliation and Orange Shirt Day

National Day for Truth and Reconciliation and Orange Shirt Day are on Tuesday, September 30th. As school is not in session that day, we ask all staff and students to wear their orange shirts to school on Monday, September 29th.



Orange Shirt Day is a legacy of the St. Joseph Mission (SJM) residential school commemoration event held in Williams Lake, BC, Canada in the spring of 2013. It grew out of *Phyllis' story* of having her shiny new orange shirt taken away on her first day of school at the Mission, and it has become an opportunity to keep the discussion on all aspects of residential schools happening annually. The date was chosen because it is the time of year in which children were taken from their homes to residential schools, and because it is an opportunity to set the stage for anti-racism and anti-bullying policies for the coming school year. It also gives teachers time to plan events that will include children, as we want to ensure that we are passing the story and learning on to the next generations. Orange Shirt Day is also an opportunity for First Nations, local governments, schools and communities to come together in the spirit of reconciliation and hope for generations of children to come. Notice to Parents and Students: Student Safety

Dear Parents and Students,

Student safety is a top priority in the Kamloops-Thompson School District. To keep students and staff safe, we have engaged in intensive safety training with our community partners—the RCMP, Secwépemc Child & Family Service, Lii Michif Otipemisiwak Family and Community Services, and the Ministry of Children and Family Development. As a result of our collective efforts, we have developed a district plan for responding to all situations where we believe students may be posing a threat to themselves or others.

District policy requires principals to activate a multidisciplinary “threat assessment” protocol whenever we have information that indicates students have made significant, high-level threats to harm themselves or others. Please review Behavioural and Digital Threat Assessment procedure on the school district website at sd73.bc.ca (under Admirative Procedures).

What is a threat?

A threat is an expression of intent to do harm or act out violently against someone or something. Threats may be verbal, written, drawn, posted on the Internet, or made by gesture. Threats must be taken seriously, investigated, and responded to.

Duty to report:

To keep school communities safe and caring, each of us—staff, parents, guardians, caregivers, students, and community members—must report all threat-related behaviours to the school principal.

What is a Site-Specific Threat Assessment Team?

The school has a site-specific threat assessment team that includes school administrators, counsellors, teachers, and a police officer.

The threat assessment process is designed to promote:

- the emotional and physical safety of students, staff, parents, the student making the threat, and others
- a full understanding of the context of the threat
- a greater understanding of the factors underlying the behaviours of the threat maker
- proactive development of an intervention plan that addresses the emotional and physical safety of the threat maker
- increased emotional and physical safety of all

A student threat assessment will be initiated for behaviours including, but not limited to:

- serious violence or violence with intent to harm or kill
- online threats to harm/kill others
- possession of weapons (including replicas)
- gang-related intimidation and violence
- verbal/written threats to harm/kill self or others (clear, direct, plausible)
- bomb threats (making and/or detonating explosive devices)
- fire starting
- sexual intimidation and violence

What parents and students need to know:

- any threat must be reported to the school principal
- investigations may involve a school or district counsellor, the police, and/or other community agencies
- investigations may involve locker or personal property searches
- interviews will be held with the threat maker and other students or adults who may have information about the threat
- parents of students who are directly involved with a threat will be notified and, depending on the circumstances, may attend the interview to provide support
- threatening behaviour may result in disciplinary action and/or change in school placement
- an intervention plan may be developed for the student making the threat and a support plan developed for any individuals targeted by threats

Collection Notice

The District is subject to personal information privacy laws and will undertake the collection of this information in compliance with the requirements of such laws, including limiting collection of information that is relevant and necessary to address a risk or threat and by ensuring that information is collected from online open-source sites. The School District will not collect information as part of a threat assessment unless there is reason to believe that a risk exists. Information collected as part of a threat assessment may be provided to law enforcement authorities in appropriate circumstances.
