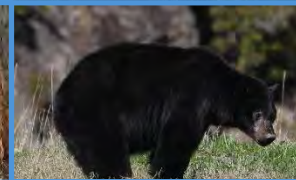
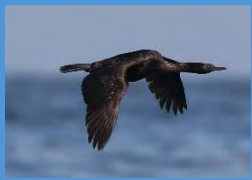




**Tofino Trip April 24-27, 2026
SD73 International Student Program**



Twenty four students and three chaperones left Kamloops at 7:00AM on April 24 and drove south down the Coquihalla Highway to Vancouver. We had washroom stop at the Britton Creek Rest Area and checked out the colony of Columbian Ground Squirrels that live nearby. After this, we drove to Hope where we had another washroom break. We then drove all the way to the Horseshoe Bay Ferry Terminal and caught our 1:25PM ferry to Nanaimo as planned. We enjoyed gorgeous weather and scenery on this 1 hour and 40 minute ferry.



The drive from Nanaimo to Tofino takes just under 3 hours and we rolled in just before 6:00PM. We had just enough time to check in and do our grocery shopping before the main grocery store closed at 8:00PM in Tofino. We then went down to the public dock in front of our hostel to watch the sunset and see any wildlife that may be around.



The next morning, we had optional wildlife viewing on the dock time from roughly 6:00-7:30AM. We then left our hostel at 8:00 and walked over to Remote Passages for our scheduled whale watch tour. We divided our group into 3 boats and headed out to try and see whales and other wildlife. With full sunshine and almost no wind, we were able to see much of the wildlife that the west coast of Vancouver Island is known for.

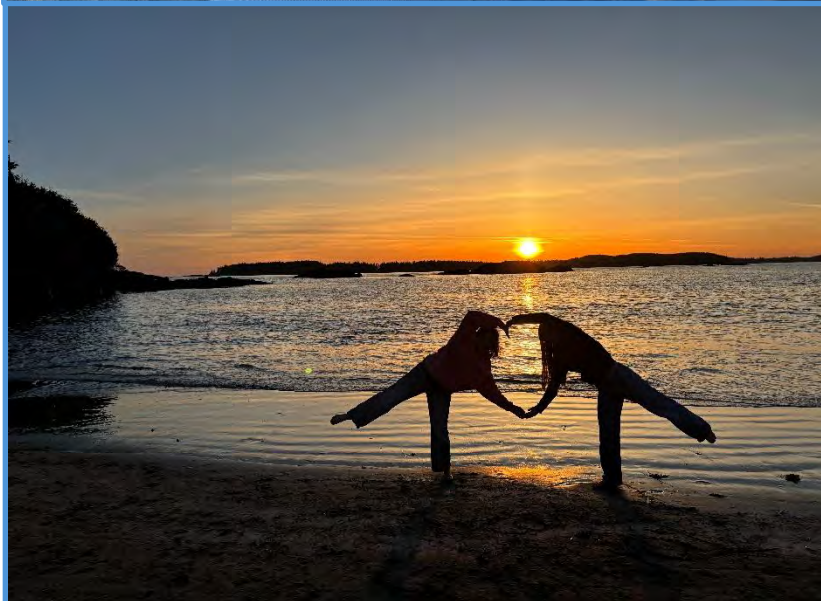


After lunch we left on the bus at 3:00PM and drove to Pacific Rim National Park where we hiked both loops of Rainforest Trail. These trails take you through old growth temperate rainforest and past some massive Red Cedar Trees, some of which are around 800 years old. We enjoyed sunshine and dry conditions on both loops.



Following the hikes we drove to Mackenzie where we did some tidal pooling, went on a short walk to the end of a headland, played beach games, and cooked hotdogs and made smores over a fire until sunset.





The next morning we had optional wildlife viewing on the dock again until 9:00AM before taking the bus down to long Beach at 9:30, enjoying 2 hours there. Students played beach games, walked into the water, or just hung out on the beach. We saw 3 Gray Whales feeding right in front of us for almost all of time there and we enjoyed watching them as well.







The photos above are from our afternoon bear watching tour following Long Beach and lunch. We then had some time for dinner before quiet time at 10:00PM. The next morning we pulled out at 7:10AM and drove towards Nanaimo for our ferry back to the mainland. We had enough time for stops at Cathedral Grove and The Old Country Market – Goats on Roof in Coombs. Cathedral Grove offers short walks through stands of ancient Douglas Fir Trees and The Old Country market is a tourist trap that sells just about everything from souvenirs to specialty foods and has buildings with goats on the roof.





The ferry was on time and everything went smooth on our return journey. We arrived in Kamloops at 8:30PM after a washroom and food stop in Hope. We saw 3 Black Bears from the bus on the way back.
